"Putting on the 2002 prom was fun and exciting, but yet it was a lot of hard work." said junior Heather Haley, junior class president.



The junior class placed second in the 9-12 division at the Homecoming parade. Their slogan was "It's the Dawn of a new Era in Cowboy Football."









Float. The boys had their annual football game on Lance's yard turned football field, and the girls always complained that the boys never helped.



After the game students attended the Homecoming dance at Skatetowne. This event was sponsored by the Spanish trip students.















Football team makes history this season

This year the Cowboys ended up with a 4-4 record in the regular season. They beat Burke for the first time since nineman football. They also advanced to second round playoffs, another first in years.

Defensively the Cowboy leaders were Shawn Klein and Croston, each having 97 tackles. Petersek had 66, and A.J. Armstrong had 44.


Defensive backs were Justin Bicek who had four interceptions, Matt Karges who had three, and Reed Petersek who had two. Klein led the defense with six sacks, followed by Armstrong with 2.5 and Cahoy and Croston with two each.

Armstrong also recovered three fumbles and caused two. Bicek recovered two. Cahoy caused two and recovered one. Croston caused and recovered one. Karges caused and recovered one. Klein recovered two. Casey Larsen caused and recovered one, and Craig Sealey recovered one.

"The Cowboys will miss the seniors this year" said Coach Armstrong. "It's hard to replace them, but we'll find someone for the job." Coach Armstrong thinks the Cowboys need to play with more intensity, be consistent, workout, and be in track in the off season to be better than a 4-4 team. He was satisfied with this year's team as the season progressed.

"The number one goal for me as a coach is to win games," said Coach Armstrong. He added that it wasn't his only goal though. He wanted to teach the kids how to be responsible, to work with other kids, and to learn teamwork. "That's why we have sports; you have to make sacrifices."

"Down through their history, the Colome Cowgirls have had many memorable seasons, but was there a more memorable one than the 2001 season, especially for the girls and coaches involved?" asked Mr. Larry Koth, head coach.

After losing all five starters from last year's third place state tournament team, many people didn't have very high expectations for this year's team. However, the girls surprised everyone, with the possible exception of themselves.

"We ended up with a 14-7 record, which ranks ninth on the all time list of best season records compiled over the last 27 years. Not bad, considering very few people gave us the chance of finishing .500," said Koth.

"We had excellent senior leadership from two girls: Sharon Klein and Kara Atteberry, who had been playing varsity basketball since their freshman year," continued Coach Koth. "They were part of our two state tournament teams, and the fact that they had been through many "big" games helped us have an eight-game winning streak in the middle of the season, plus victories over Gregory and Burke. They led by example and were excellent role models for the younger girls. The younger girls responded by playing better than expected and by laying a good foundation for future Cowgirl teams. We didn't go to the State Tournament, or even win our District, but the 2001 season was a most memorable and enjoyable season."

The Cowgirls outperformed their opponents in several statistics. They outscored their opponents 906-867. They outrebounded their opponents 582-557. They also stole the ball 249 times compared to 139 by their opponents. The opponents did have more assists with 217, while the Cowgirls had 214.

"We came together and surprised a lot of teams," said Kara Atteberry. "I thought we had a very productive season."

Top scorers for Colome were Klein with 251 points. Atteberry with 229 points, Stacy Ring with 165 points, and Sammy Steinke with 161 points. Pulling down rebounds for the Cowgirls were Klein with 168, Kristy Zink with 98, Ring with 89, and Atteberry with 88. Steinke had 88 assists to lead Colome. Ring had 39 assists, and Atteberry had 35 assists. Klein stole the ball 70 times, followed by Ring with 53. Steinke with 42, and Atteberry with 35. Atteberry sho 78.7% from the free throw line to lead the Cowgirls. Klein followed with 64.4%. Ring led the team in total field goal percentage with 39.6%, followed by Klein with 39%.

"I had a lot of fun this year, and it was a great learning experience for me," said sophomore Stacy Ring. "I am going to miss the seniors a lot next year, but I am looking forward to the coming season."

Senior Kara Atteberry and sophomore Stacy Ring were named to the Southern Plains All-Conference Tournament team. Atteberry and Sharon Klein were named to the South Central and Southern Plains All-Conference teams, and each received SPC scholarships.


The JV Cowgirls ended their season 7-8. The team consisted of twelve girls from grades eight to eleven. The head coach was Mende Supik. The team averaged 29.3 points (439), while their opponents averaged 30.5 points (457). The Cowgirls shot 34.3% (172-501) from the field compared to 29.9% (175-585) by their opponents. They also grabbed 347 rebounds while their opponents only grabbed 322 rebounds. They also had 102 assists compared to 74 by their opponents.




