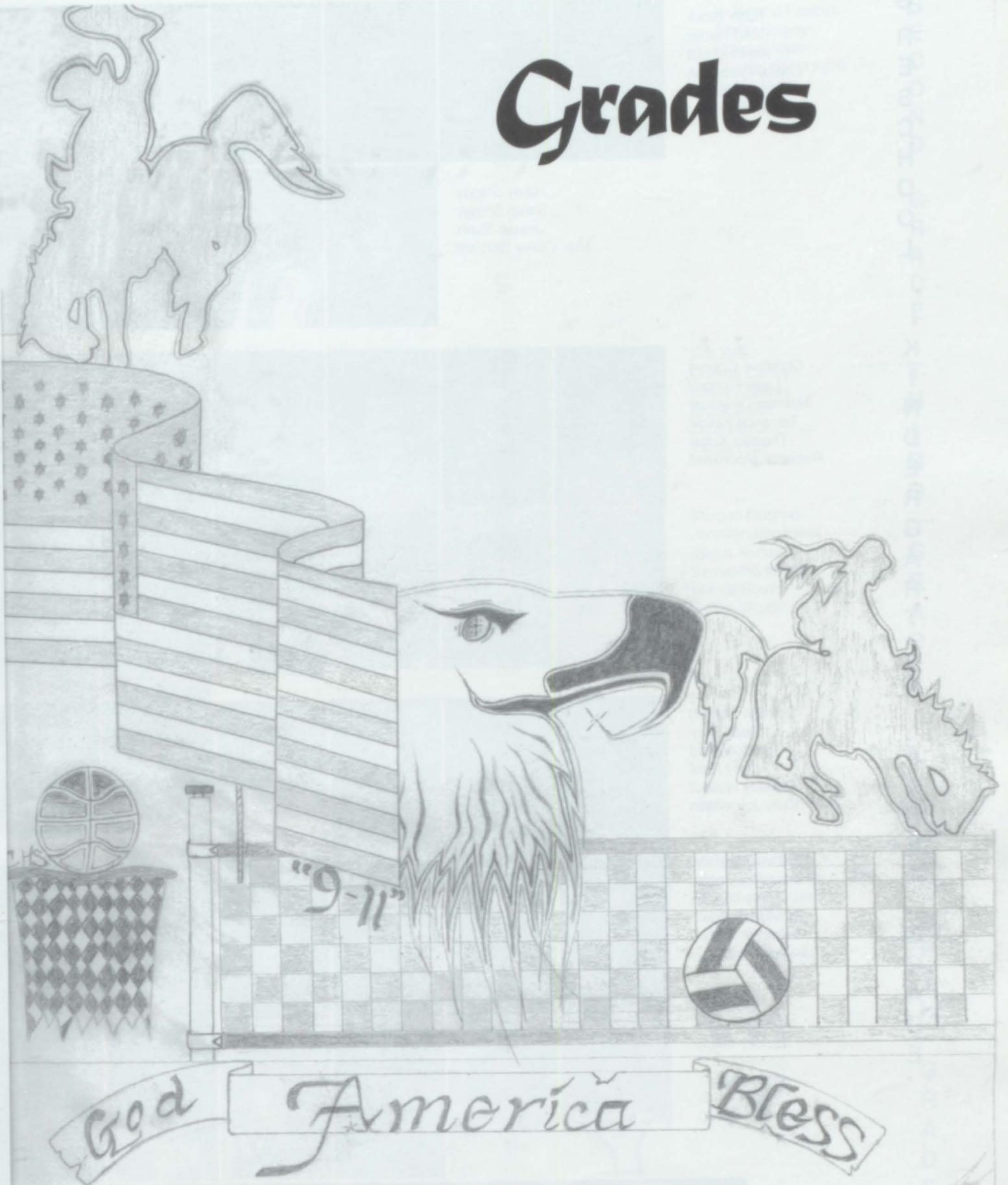

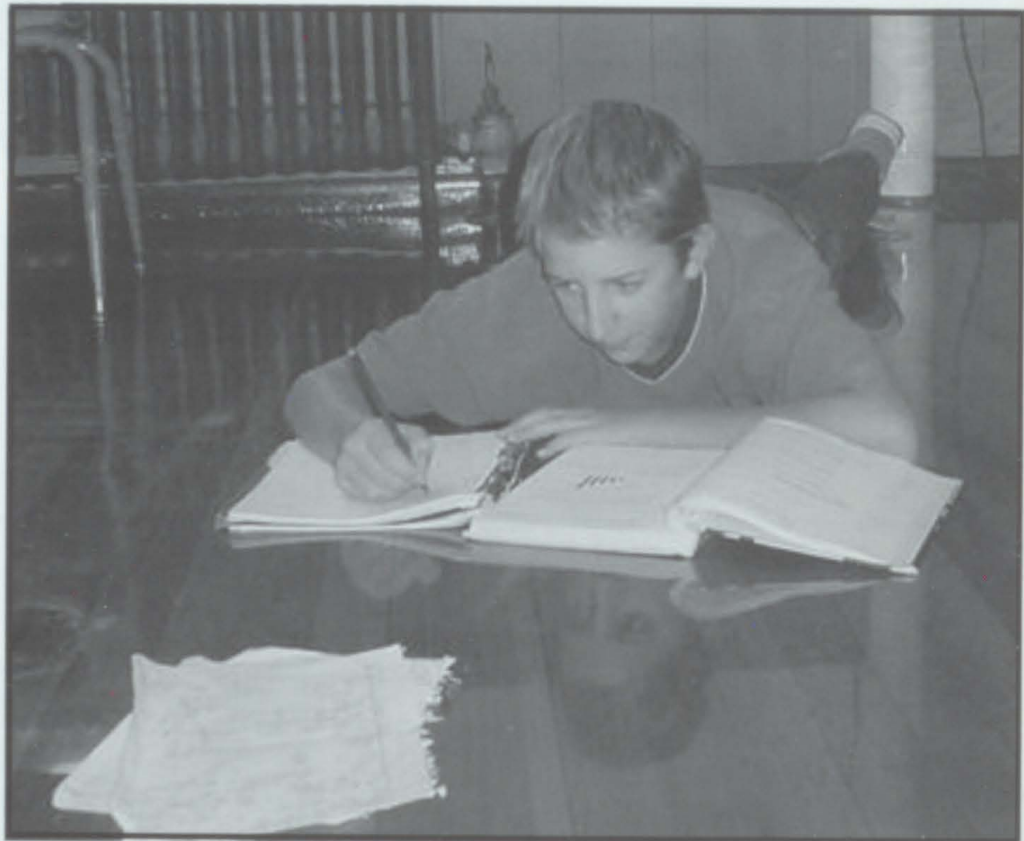

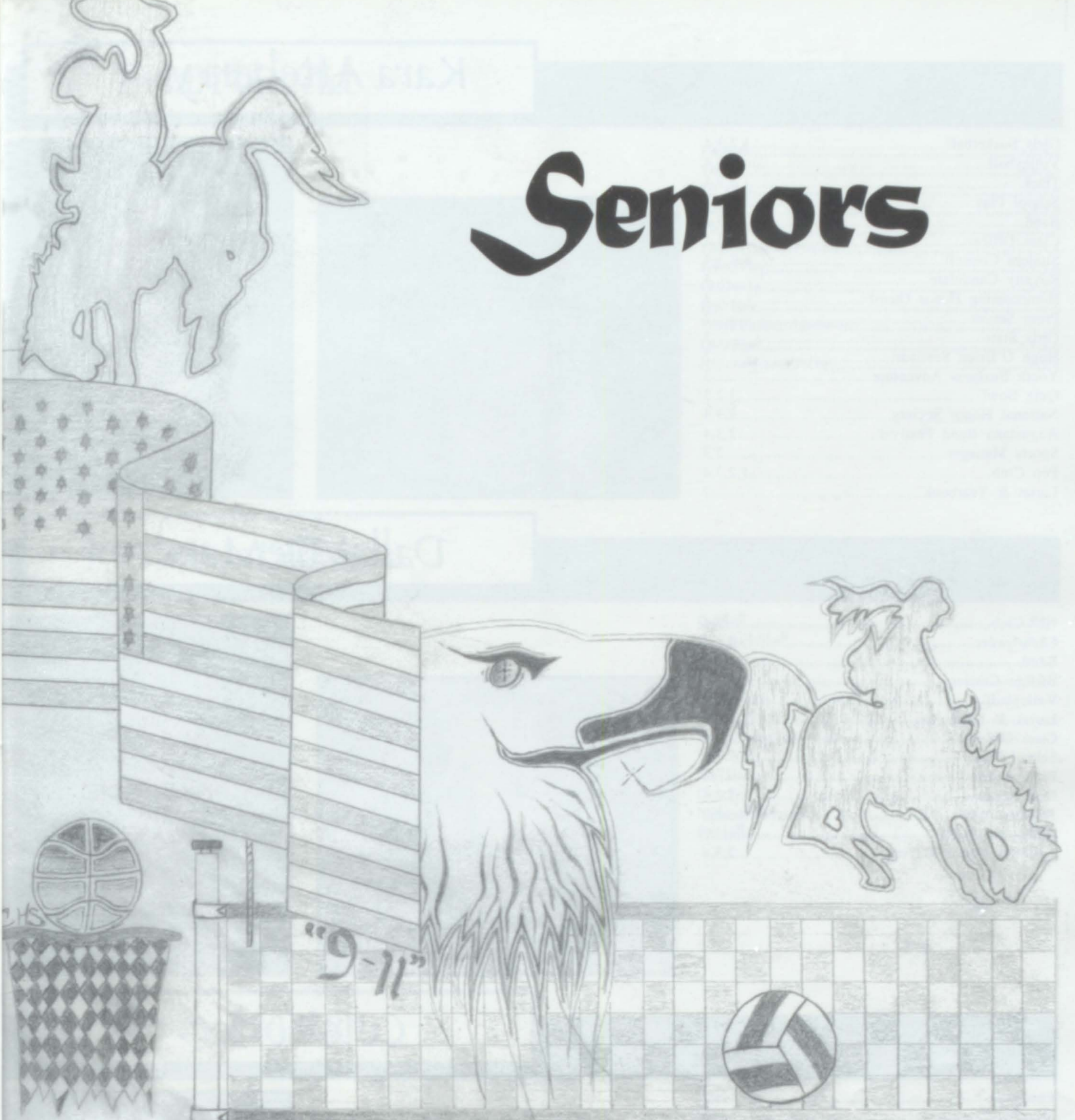

"I will always remember Mr. Sherman's classes," said Lynn Woods. "I will never forget the senior class trip to Pierre."

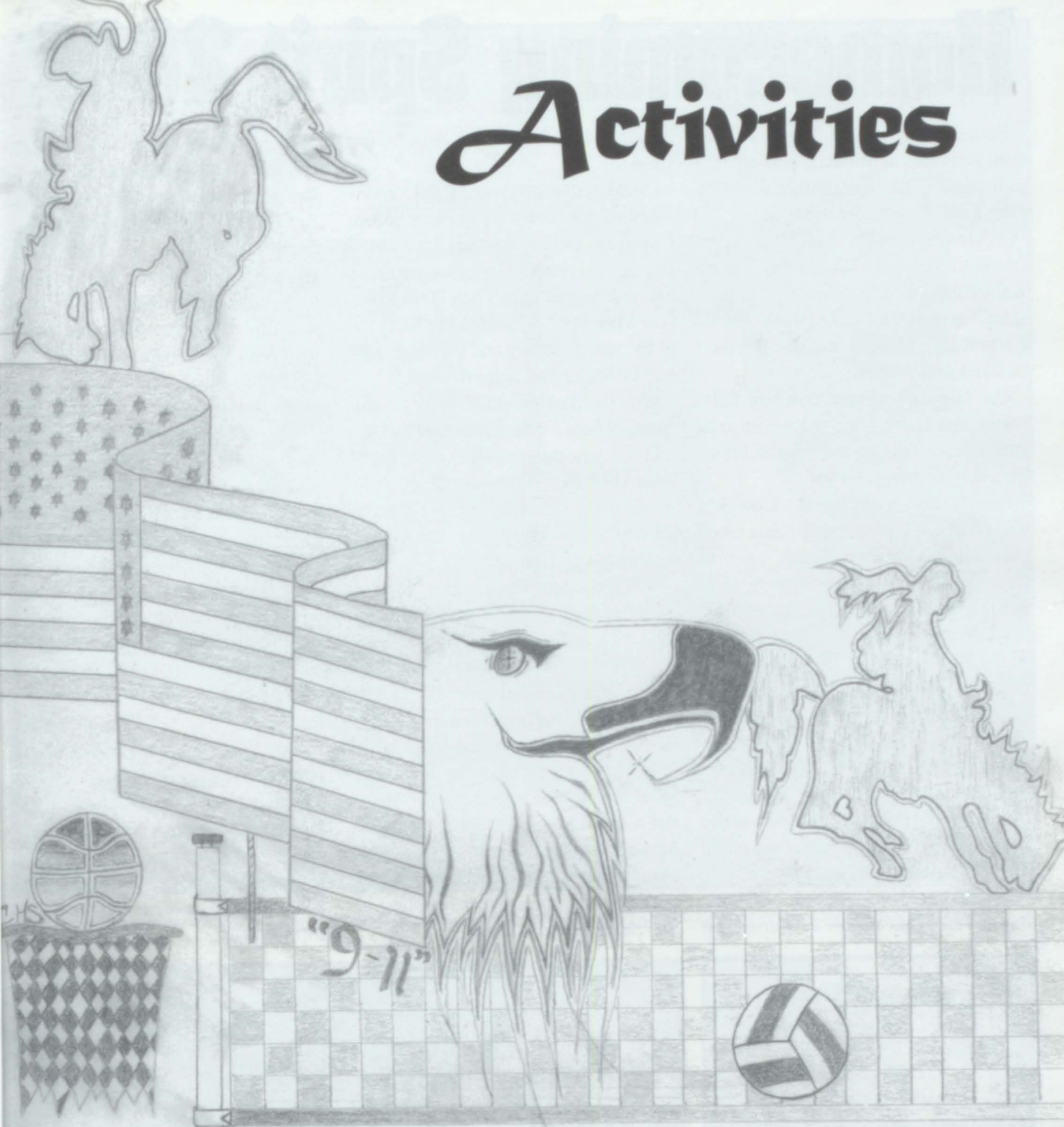
Everyone said they would miss their friends. The members of the Class of 2002 have always been tight, and there is a wide range of personalities that makes them go together so well.

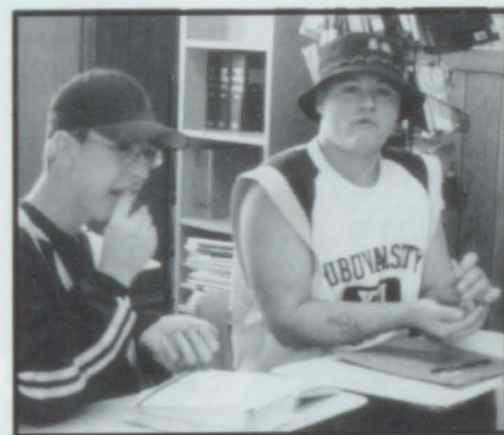
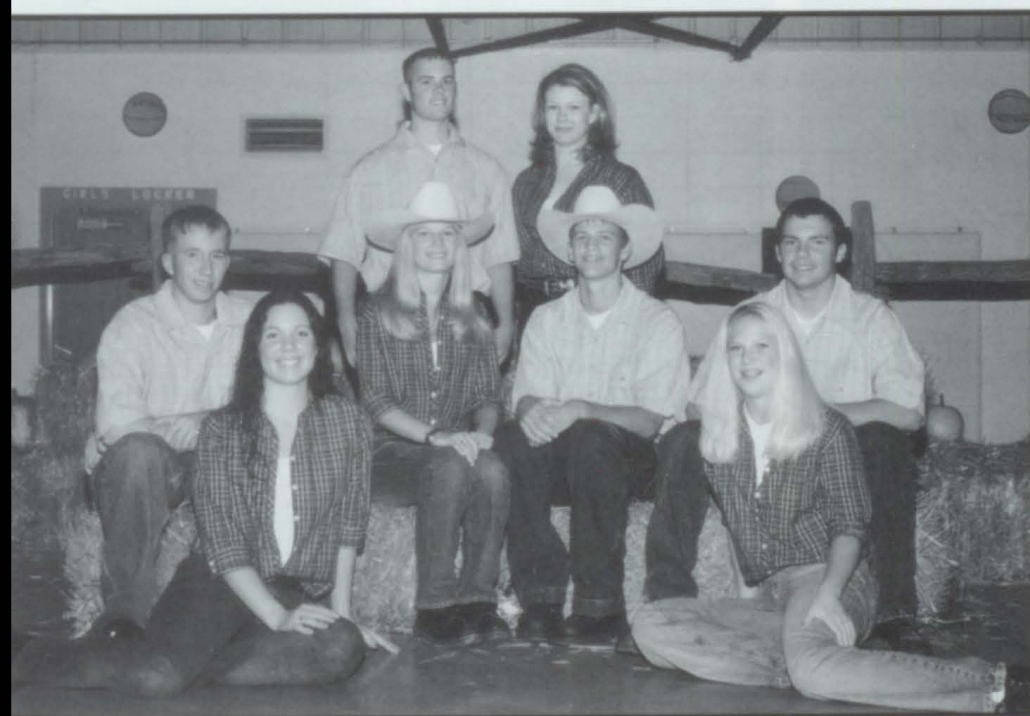

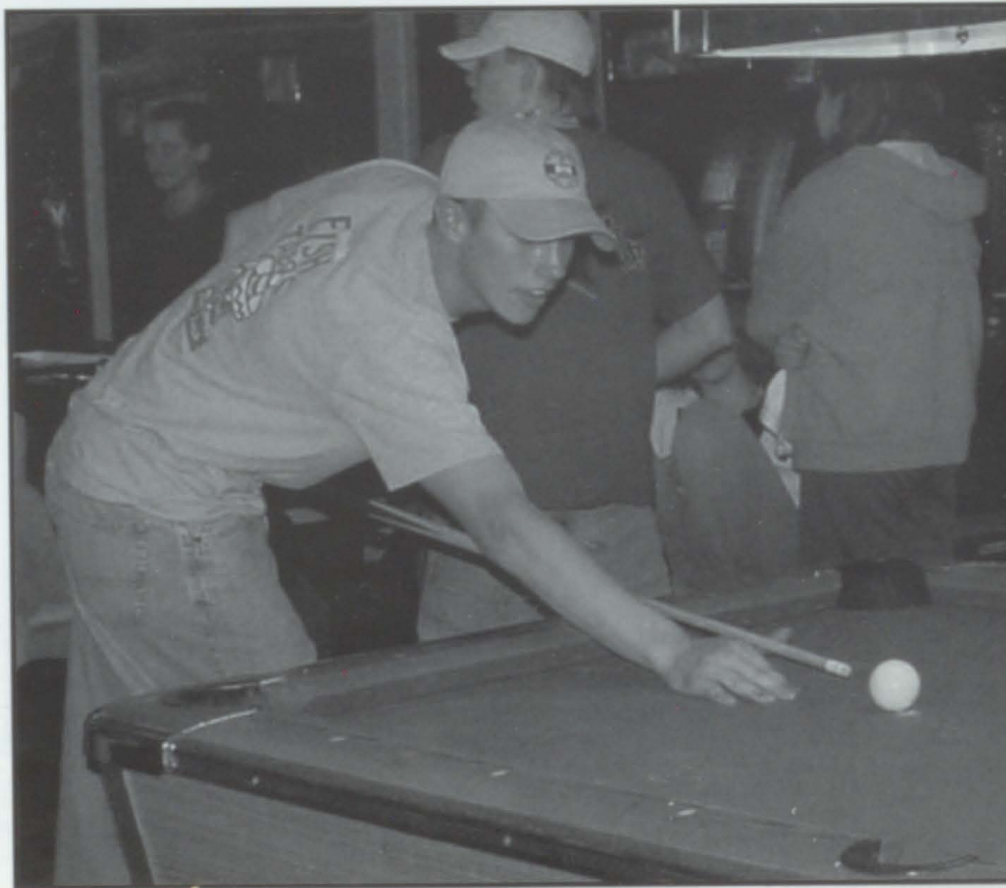

At the conclusion of his message, seven seniors played their last song with the band as they performed "Funky Town."

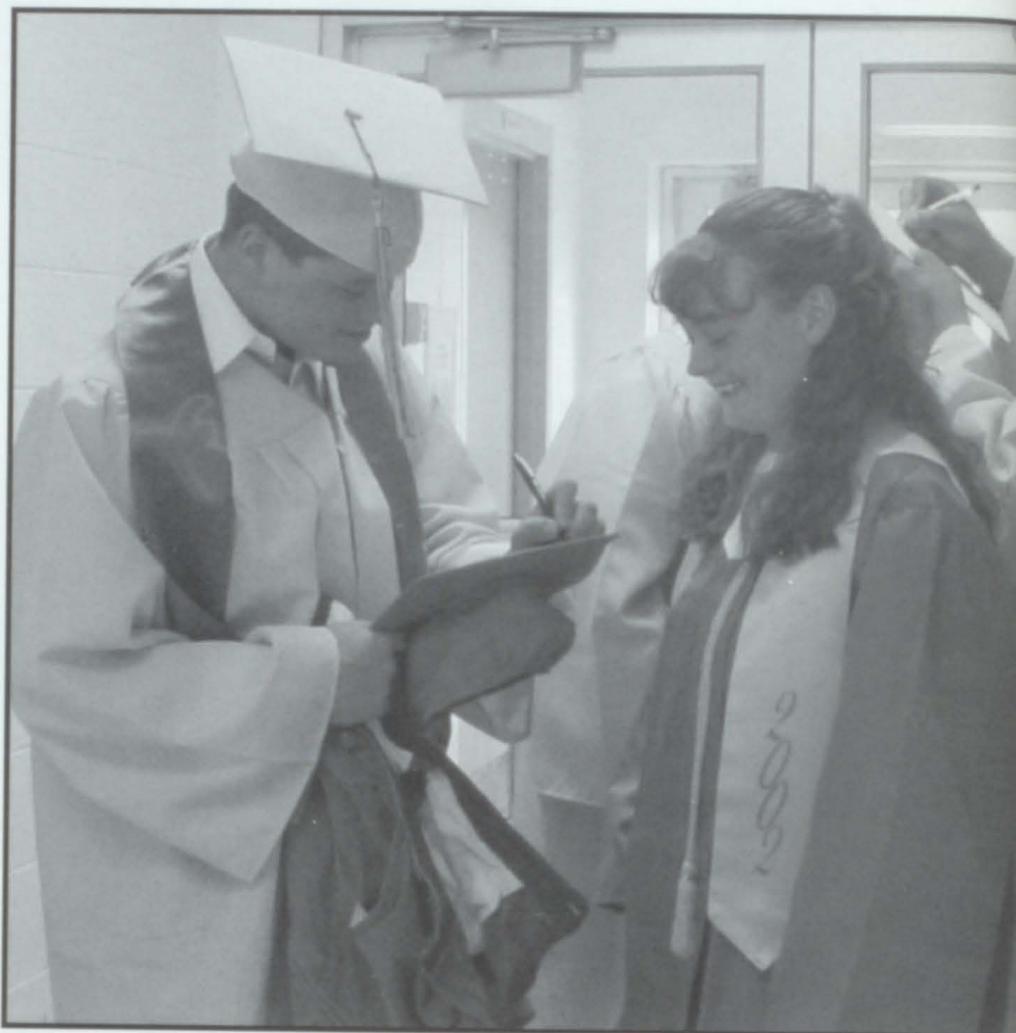

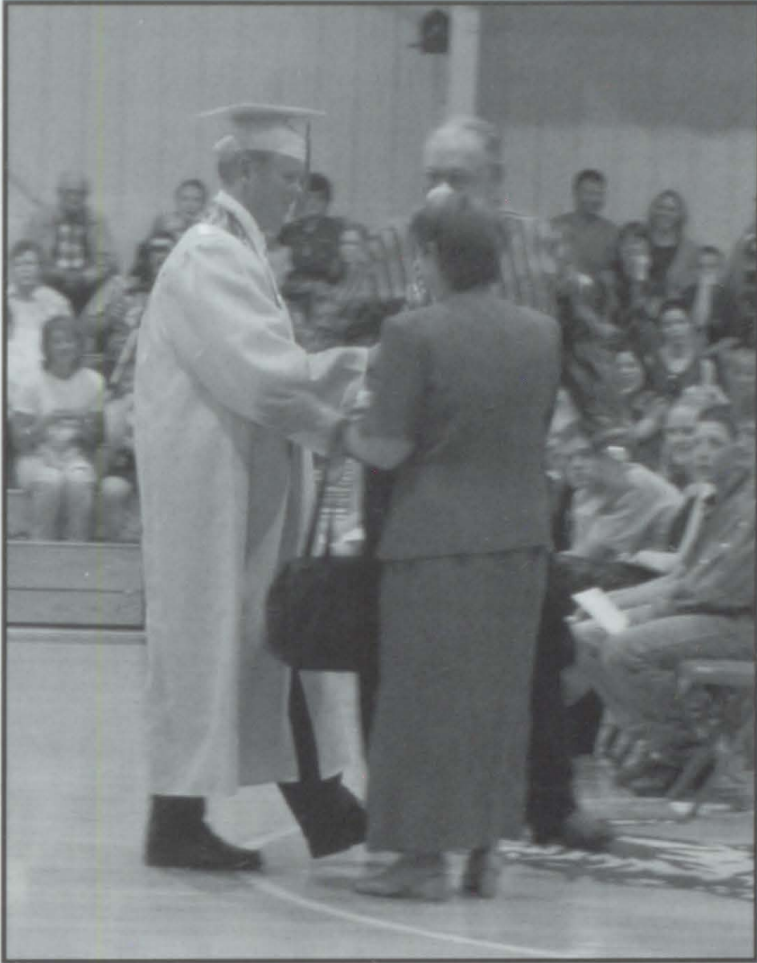

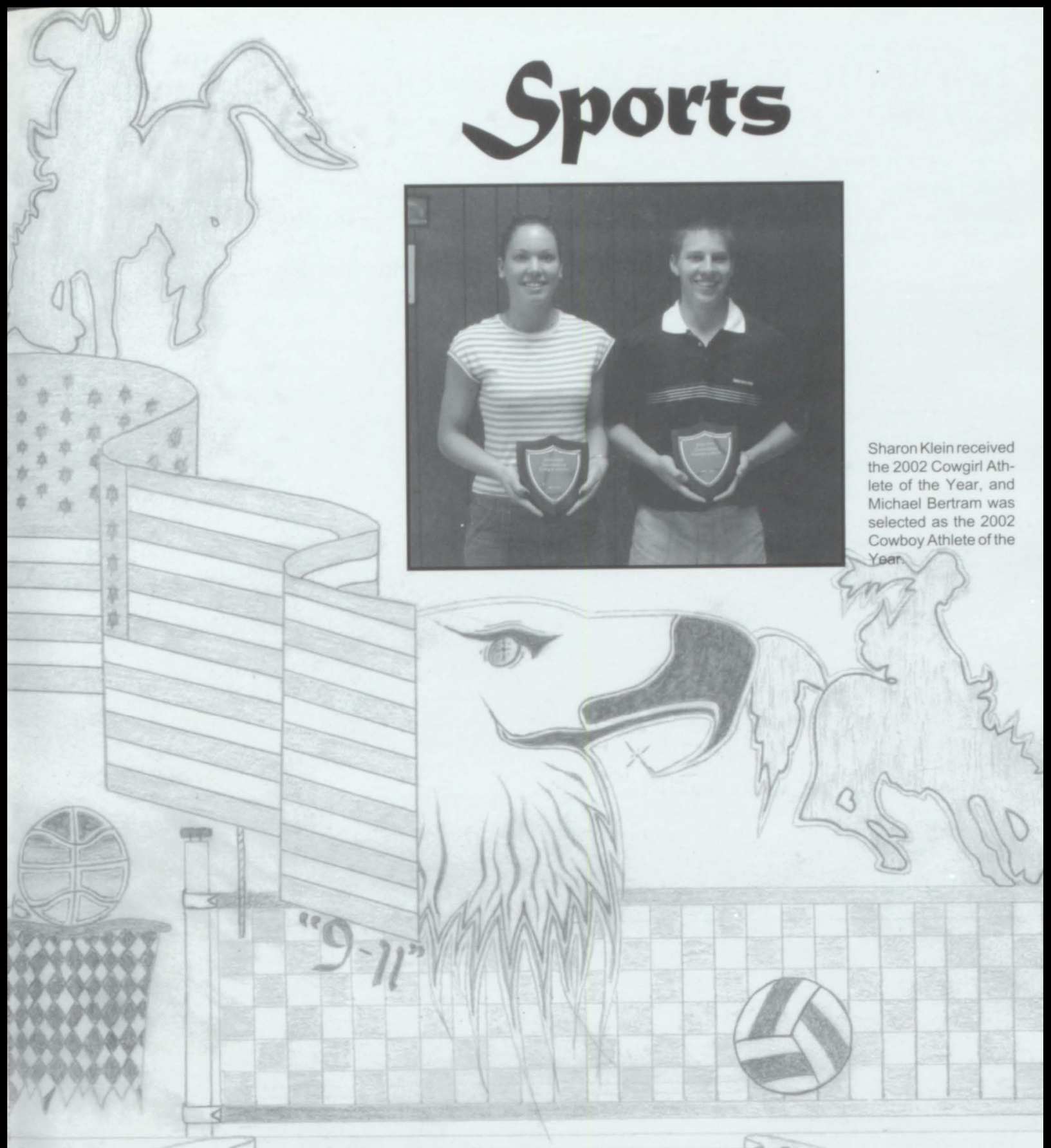

# Football team makes history this season

This year the Cowboys ended up with a 4-4 record in the regular season. They beat Burke for the first time since nine-man football. They also advanced to second round playoffs, another first in years.

Offensive Cowboy leader was Dustin Schrader who had 563 total yards and averaged 6.7 yards per carry. He had seven touchdowns. Glen Larsen had 559 yards and averaged 4.3 yards a carry. He had nine touchdowns. Reed Petersek had 322 yards and averaged 4.7 yards a carry. He had 3 touchdowns.

For receiving, Michael Cahoy had 182 reception yards and averaged 22.8 yards a catch. He also had one touchdown. Tyler Croston had 175 reception yards and averaged 12.5 yards a catch. He had two touchdowns. Schrader had 147 yards in receptions and averaged 18.4 yards a catch and had 2 receiving touchdowns.

Quarterback Mike Bertram threw for 780 yards and eight touchdowns. Bertram was 42%.

Defensively the Cowboy leaders were Shawn Klein and Croston, each having 97 tackles. Petersek had 66, and A.J. Armstrong had 44.

Defensive backs were Justin Bicek who had four interceptions, Matt Karges who had three, and Reed Petersek who had two.

Klein led the defense with six sacks, followed by Armstrong with 2.5 and Cahoy and Croston with two each.

Armstrong also recovered three fumbles and caused two. Bicek recovered two. Cahoy caused two and recovered one. Croston caused and recovered one. Karges caused and recovered one. Klein recovered two. Casey Larsen caused and recovered one, and Craig Sealey recovered one.

"The Cowboys will miss the seniors this year" said Coach Armstrong. "It's hard to replace them, but we'll find someone for the job." Coach Armstrong thinks the Cowboys need to play with more intensity, be consistent, workout, and be in track in the off season to be better than a 4-4 team. He was satisfied with this year's team as the season progressed.

"The number one goal for me as a coach is to win games," said Coach Armstrong. He added that it wasn't his only goal though. He wanted to teach the kids how to be responsible, to work with other kids, and to learn teamwork. "That's why we have sports; you have to make sacrifices."

Football awards were given to the following individuals: Tyler Croston, Most Valuable Defense; Michael Cahoy, Most Improved; Glen Larsen, Most Valuable Back; Shawn Klein, Most Valuable Lineman and Honorable Mention for 9B All-State Team; Pat Dougherty, Top Freshman Prosepect; and Reed Petersek, Most Inspirational.

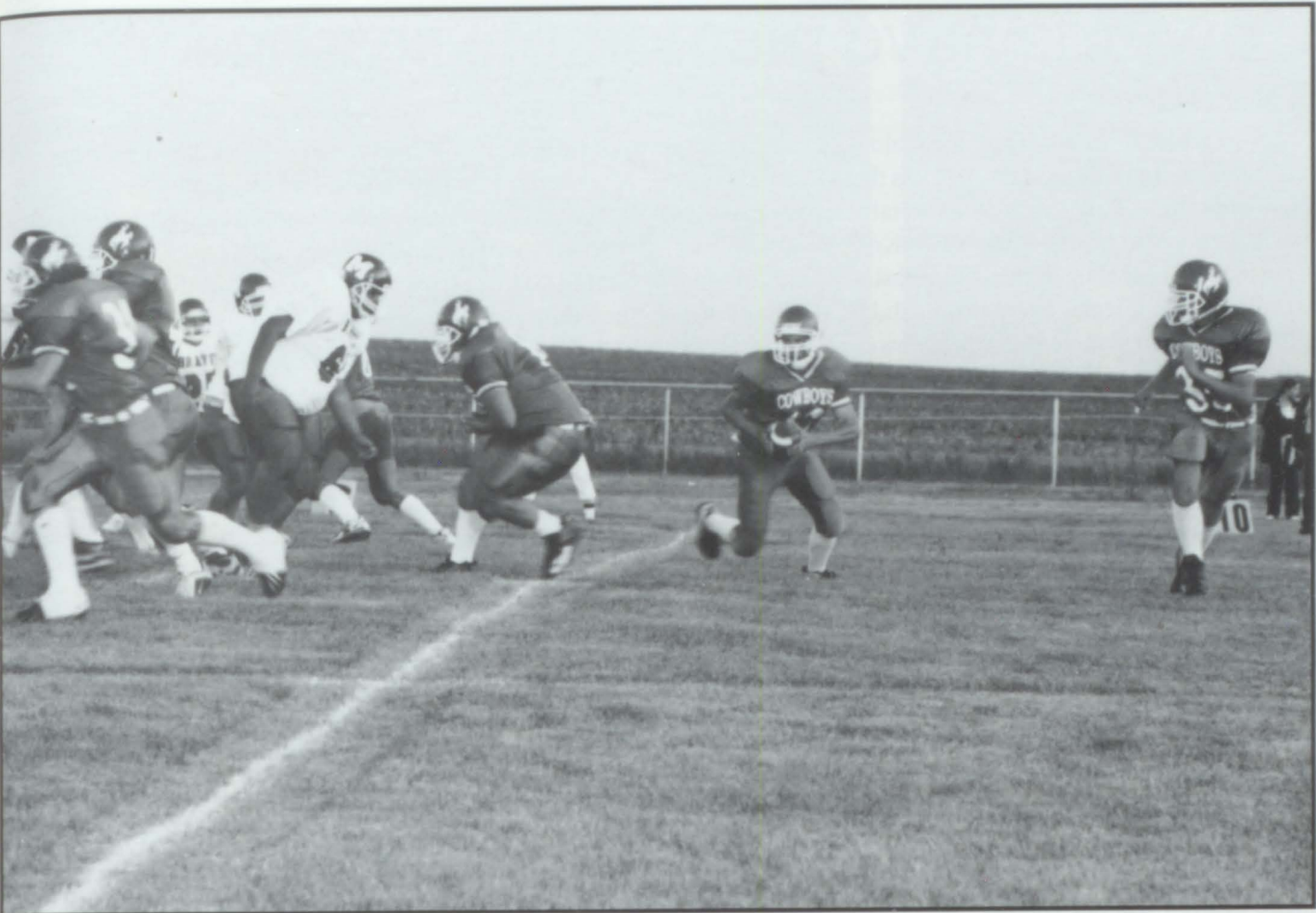

# Cowgirls have memorable season

"Down through their history, the Colome Cowgirls have had many memorable seasons, but was there a more memorable one than the 2001 season, especially for the girls and coaches involved?" asked Mr. Larry Koth, head coach.

After losing all five starters from last year's third place state tournament team, many people didn't have very high expectations for this year's team. However, the girls surprised everyone, with the possible exception of themselves.

"We ended up with a 14-7 record, which ranks ninth on the all time list of best season records compiled over the last 27 years. Not bad, considering very few people gave us the chance of finishing .500," said Koth.

"We had excellent senior leadership from two girls: Sharon Klein and Kara Atteberry, who had been playing varsity basketball since their freshman year," continued Coach Koth. "They were part of our two state tournament teams, and the fact that they had been through many "big" games helped us have an eight-game winning streak in the middle of the season, plus victories over Gregory and Burke. They led by example and were excellent role models for the younger girls. The younger girls responded by playing better than expected and by laying a good foundation for future Cowgirl teams. We didn't go to the State Tournament, or even win our District, but the 2001 season was a most memorable and enjoyable season."

The Cowgirls outperformed their opponents in several statistics. They outscored their opponents 906-867. They outrebounded their opponents 582-557. They also stole the ball 249 times compared to 139 by their opponents. The opponents did have more assists with 217, while the Cowgirls had 214.

"We came together and surprised a lot of teams," said Kara Atteberry. "I thought we had a very productive season."

Top scorers for Colome were Klein with 251 points, Atteberry with 229 points, Stacy Ring with 165 points, and Sammy Steinke with 161 points. Pulling down rebounds for the Cowgirls were Klein with 168, Kristy Zink with 98, Ring with 89, and Atteberry with 88. Steinke had 88 assists to lead Colome. Ring had 39 assists, and Atteberry had 35 assists. Klein stole the ball 70 times, followed by Ring with 53, Steinke with 42, and Atteberry with 35. Atteberry shot 78.7% from the free throw line to lead the Cowgirls. Klein followed with 64.4%. Ring led the team in total field goal percentage with 39.6%, followed by Klein with 39%.

"I had a lot of fun this year, and it was a great learning experience for me," said sophomore Stacy Ring. "I am going to miss the seniors a lot next year, but I am looking forward to the coming season."

Senior Kara Atteberry and sophomore Stacy Ring were named to the Southern Plains All-Conference Tournament team. Atteberry and Sharon Klein were named to the South Central and Southern Plains All-Conference teams, and each received SPC scholarships.

The JV Cowgirls ended their season 7-8. The team consisted of twelve girls from grades eight to eleven. The head coach was Mende Supik. The team averaged 29.3 points (439), while their opponents averaged 30.5 points (457). The Cowgirls shot 34.3% (172-501) from the field compared to 29.9% (175-585) by their opponents. They also grabbed 347 rebounds while their opponents only grabbed 322 rebounds. They also had 102 assists compared to 74 by their opponents.

# Cowboys have winning season

A goal that Head Coach Larry Koth had set for the Cowboy basketball team was to win over half the games and make it to the District championship. The Cowboys met those goals.

The season for the team ended when the Cowboys faced Marty in the District championship game. Their final record was 11-10.

"They did their part to show me what they could do," said Koth. "I have always thought that the boys have played well as a team, and they showed it when it meant the most."

Coach Koth added, "They are a great bunch of kids, on and off the court."

At the end of the season, the Cowboys outscored their opponents 1270 to 1186. They had a point average per game of 60.5, and their opponents averaged 56.5.

The top scorer for Colome was Tyler Croston with a total 238 points, and Michael Bertram had a total of 232. Because of a wrist injury, Bertram was unable to play part of the season. Bertram led the team in points per game average with 14.5. Croston had 11.3.

Also scoring points for the Cowboys were Dustin Schrader with 224 points (10.7 per game), Justin Bicek with 218 points (10.4 per game), and Jordan Graesser with 210 points (10 per game).

The team's free throw percentage was 61.8%, compared to 54% by their opponents.

Leading in total rebounds was Tyler Croston with 107 which gave him an average for 5.1 rebounds per game. He was followed by Jordan Graesser with 89, Dustin Schrader with 82, and Justin Bicek with 71.

At the end of the year, Coach Koth presented the following awards: Kyle Beck, Most Promising Freshman; Dustin Schrader, Hustle Award; Tyler Croston, Mr. Rebounder, 10,000 Shot Club, MVP Award, and SCC Honorable Mention; Michael Cahoy, Most Improved Player; Michael Bertram, Defensive Specialist Award, 10,000 Shot Club Member, SCC All-Conference medal; and Justin Bicek, Best Free Throw Percentage and 10,000 Shot Club.

Desi Foster led the Cowgirls in spiking with 73% with 110 of 151 earning 51 kills. Leading setter for the Cowgirls was Dana O'Bryan with 90% completing 566 of 628 with 151 assists. Leading the Cowgirls in digs was Michaela Bicek with 73% successfully digging 16 of 22 spikes. Leading receiver for the team was Sharon Klein with 88%. Klein successfully received 170 of 193 passes.

Individual season highs such as highest point average in a game or most kills per game were also tallied for the season. Leading in average points scored per game was Atteberry with 3.5. Highest amount of digs in one game went to Michaela Bicek with 6 digs against Kadoka. Kristy Zink takes the title for most points scored in one game with 18 against Jones County. Zink and Stacy Ring are tied for most solo blocks in one game with three against Burke and Jones

County respectively. Highest number of kills in one game went to Foster with 8 kills against Jones County. The highest amount of ace serves in one game goes to Lynn Woods with 9 aces serves against St. Francis. "I believe volleyball was a great experience this year. We might not have had the season some people dreamed for us, but at least we had fun doing it," said senior Lynn Woods. "The fun memories will stick with us a lot longer than the winning or losing record."

Coach Indahl said she had many memorable moments with the team this year from the practices. "I feel that we are going to have a good team next season. We have gained varsity experience and that will only benefit our team. We will have five returning letter winners next season along with some up and coming talent. There is no doubt that the talent will be there next season. All we need to do is utilize it, and we will be a successful team."

The Colome Junior Varsity team ended the season with a record of 2-11. "I enjoyed watching the girls progress as volleyball players this year, especially when the younger girls learned the basics of the game and felt that they could succeed," said JV Coach Korey Bertram. "My favorite memory of this year by far was when Kristy Zink went through the locker room door on her scooter, but then again, anything Kristy does usually ends up being memorable."

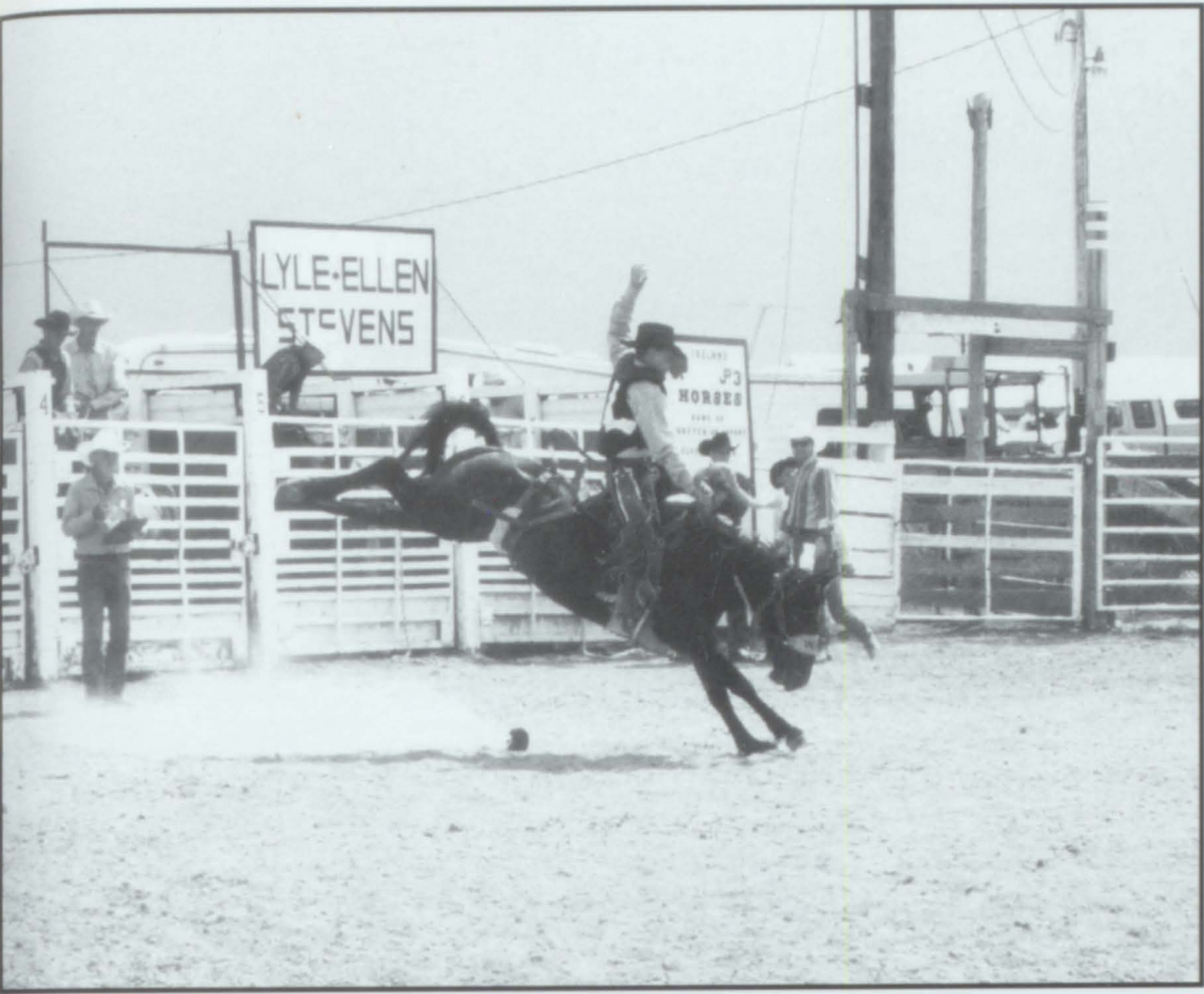

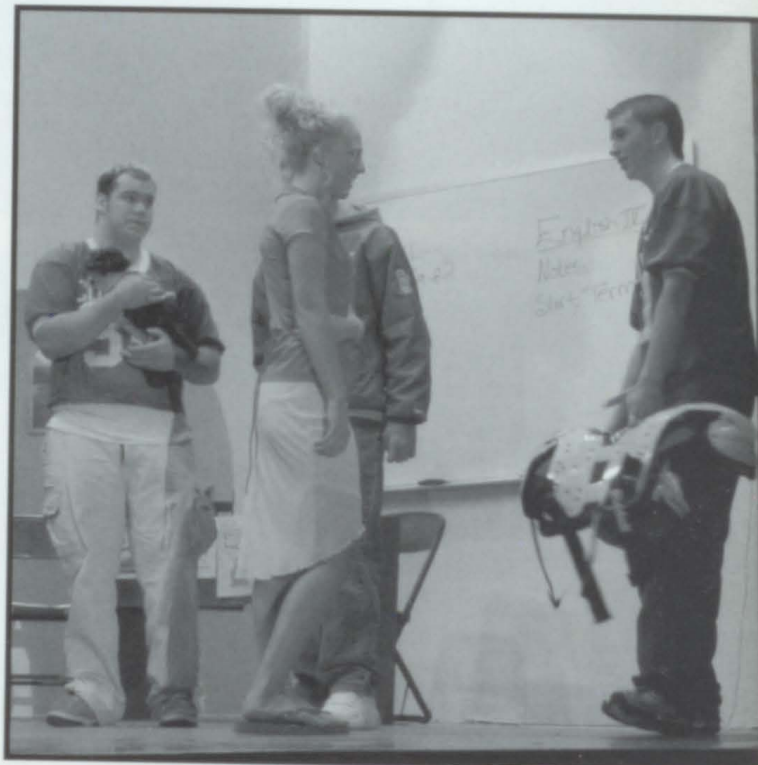

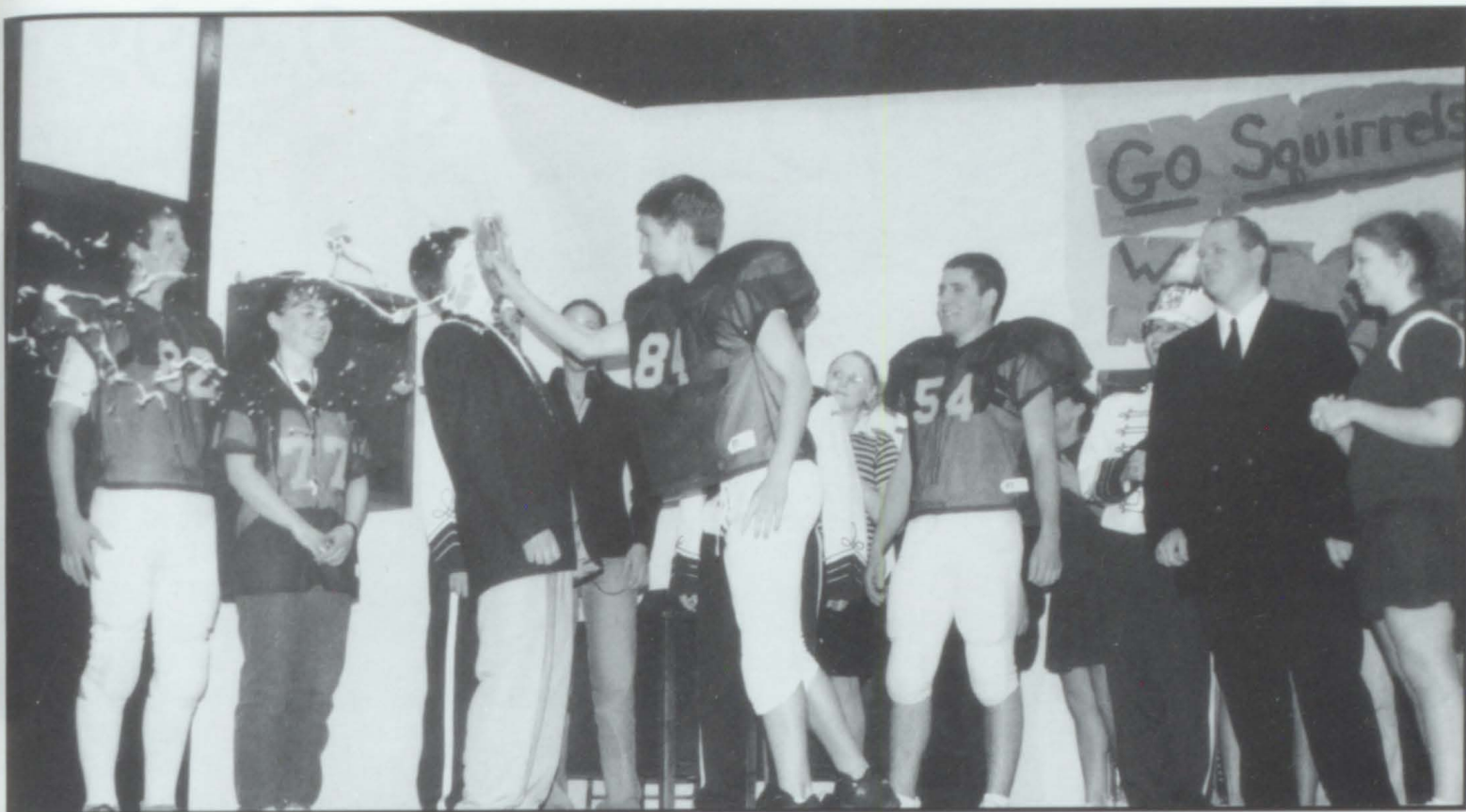

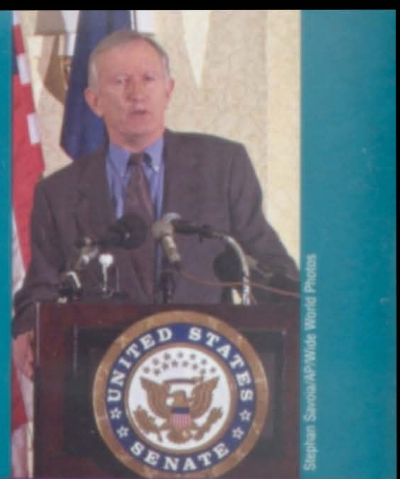

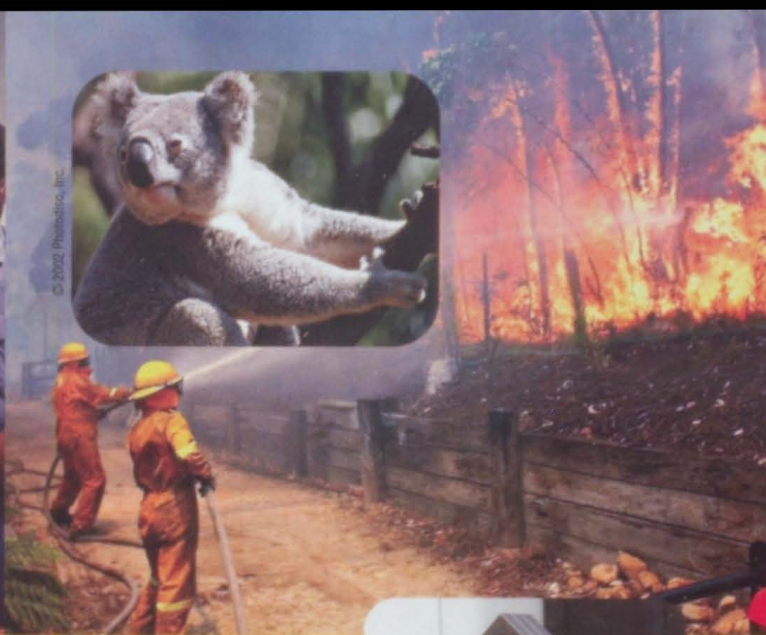

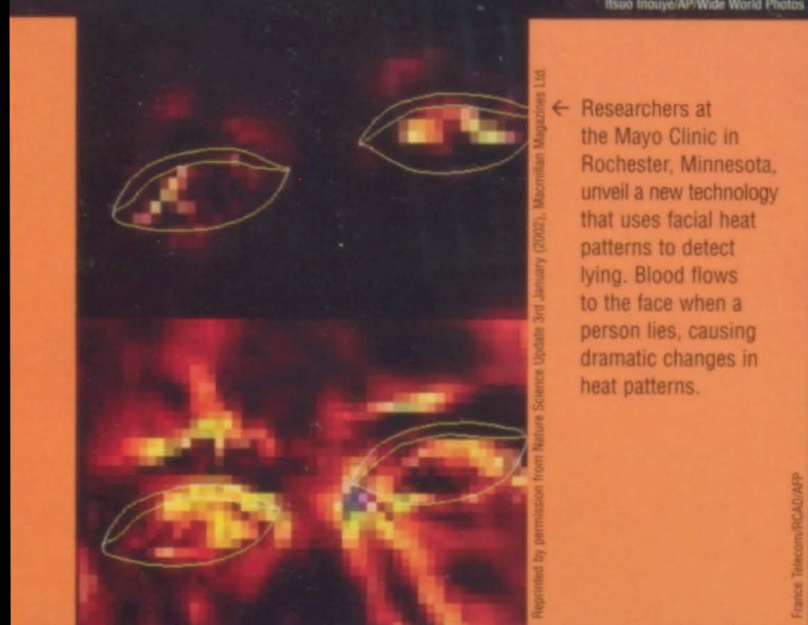

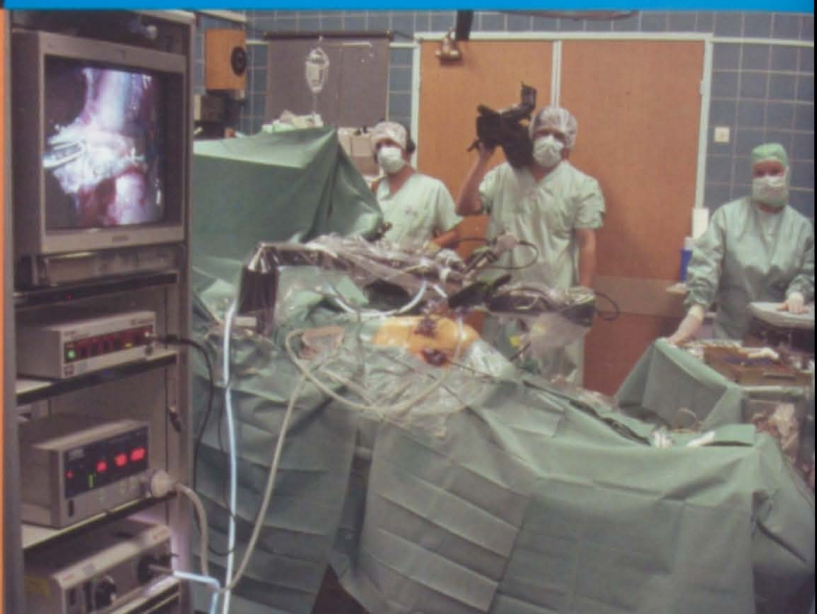

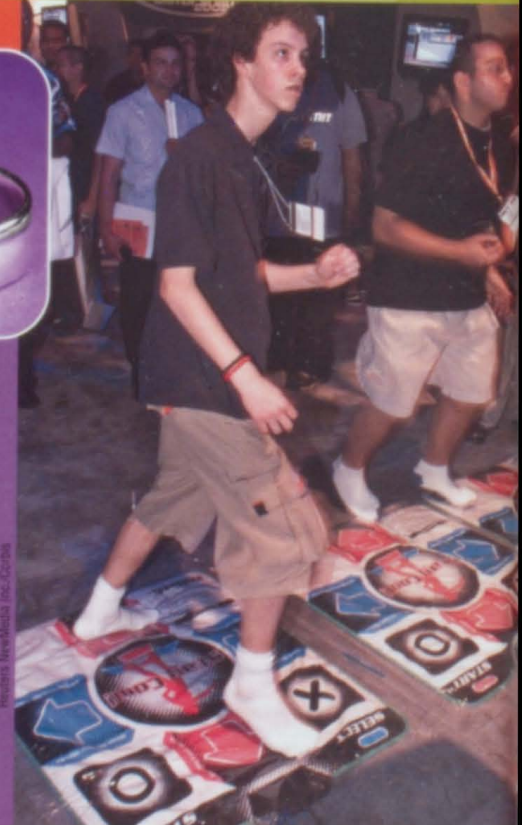

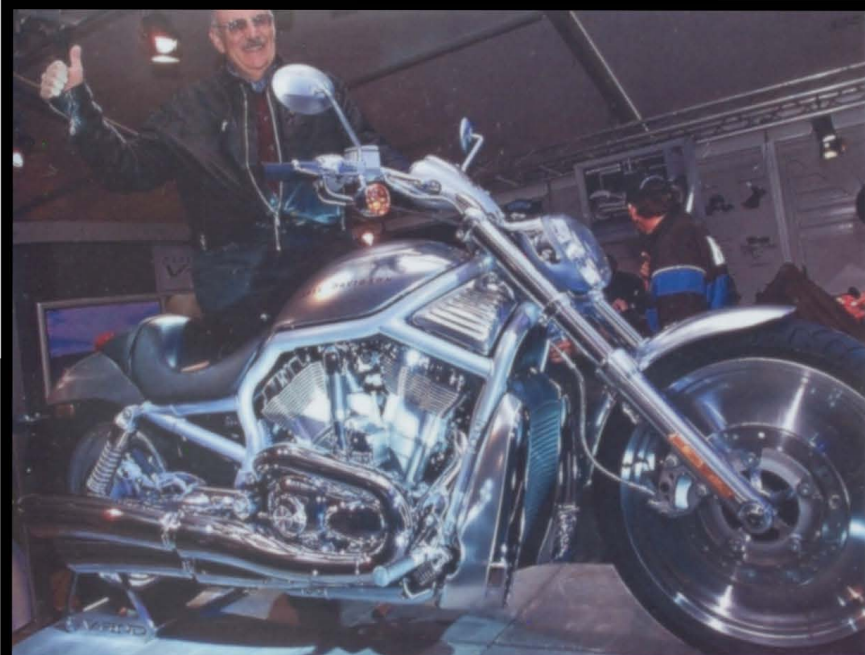

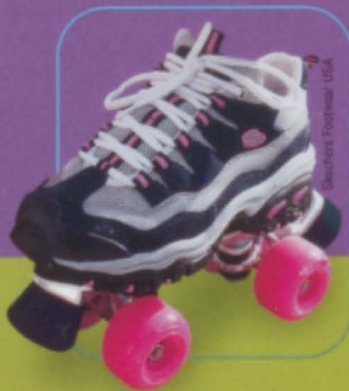

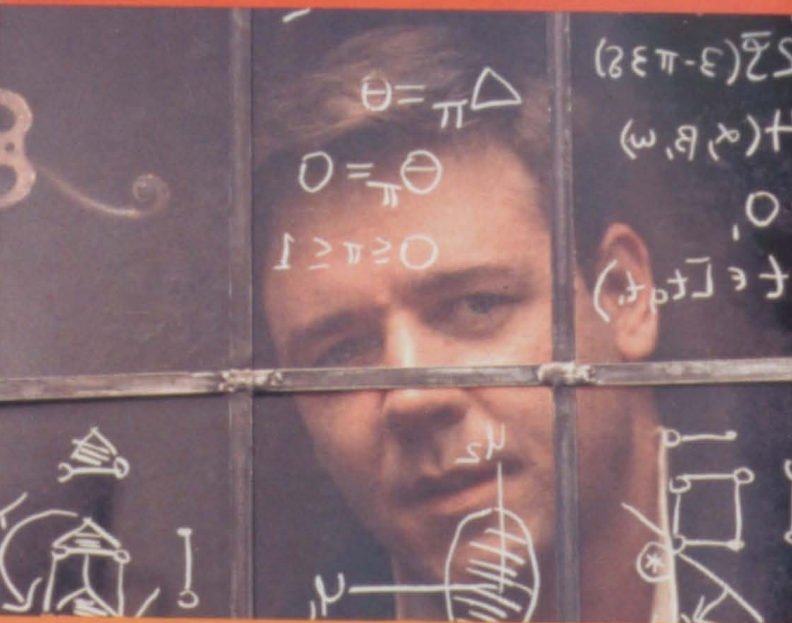

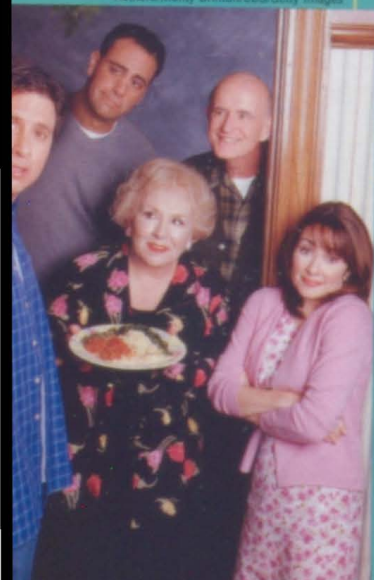

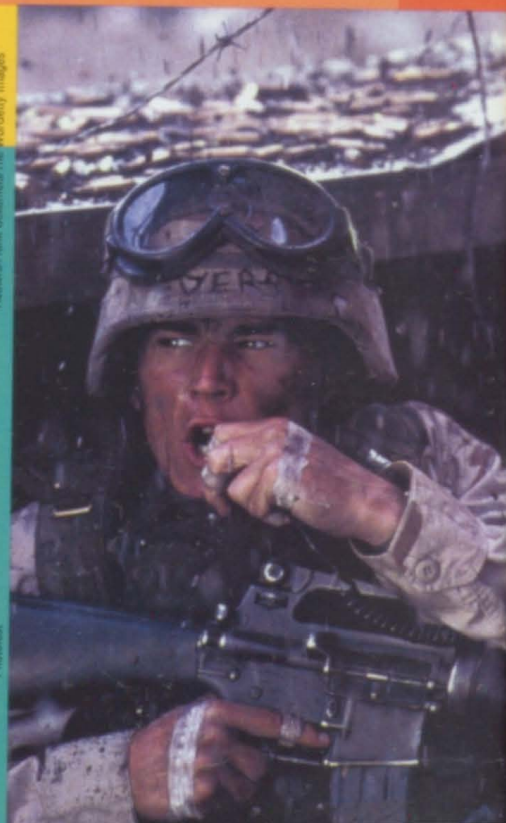

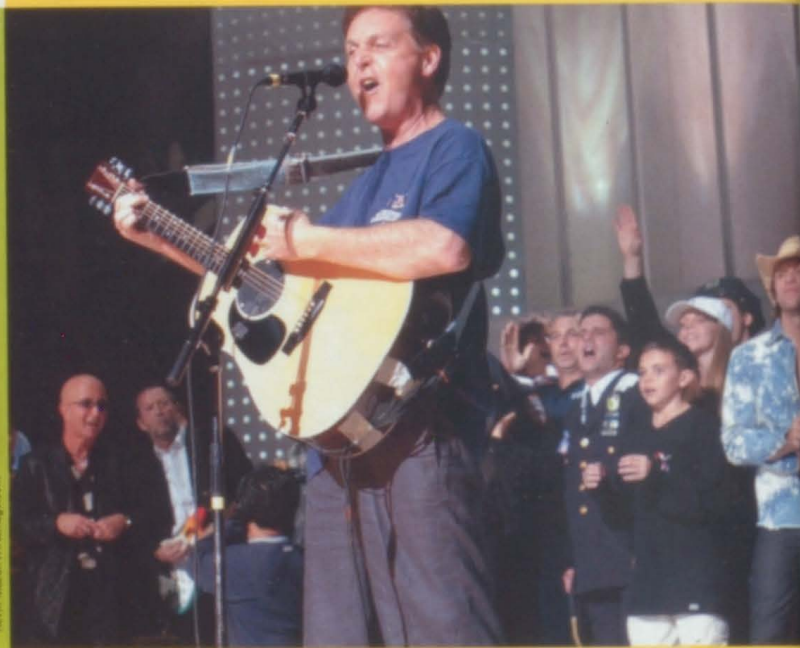

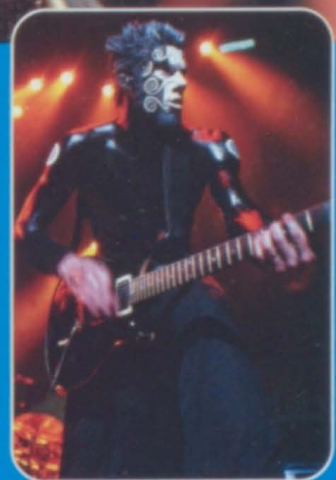

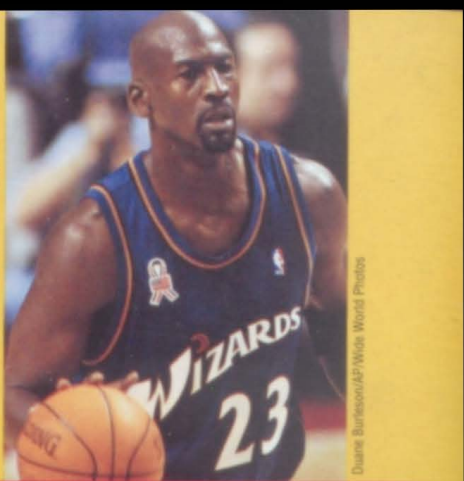

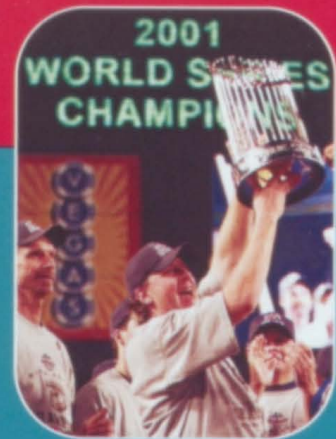

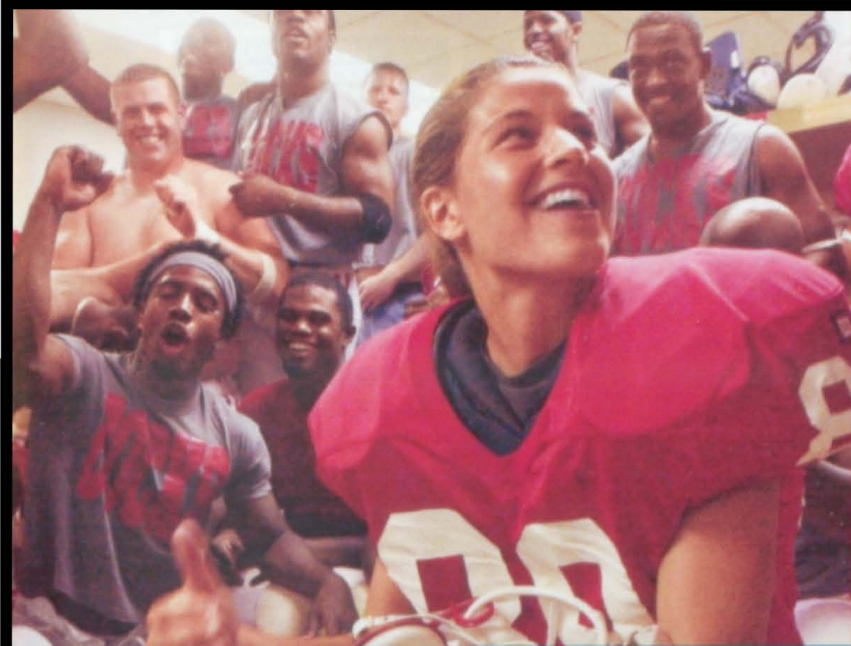

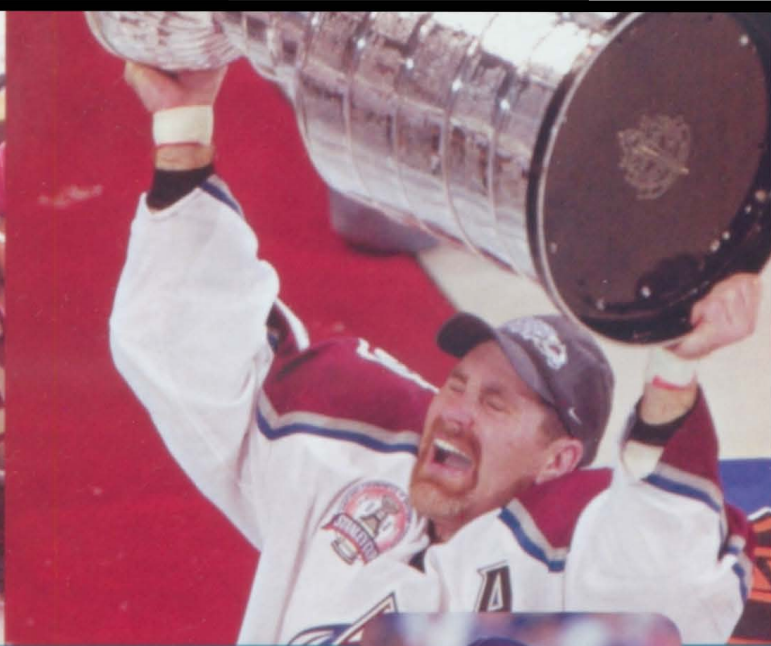

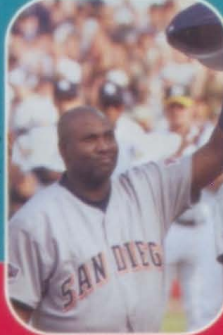

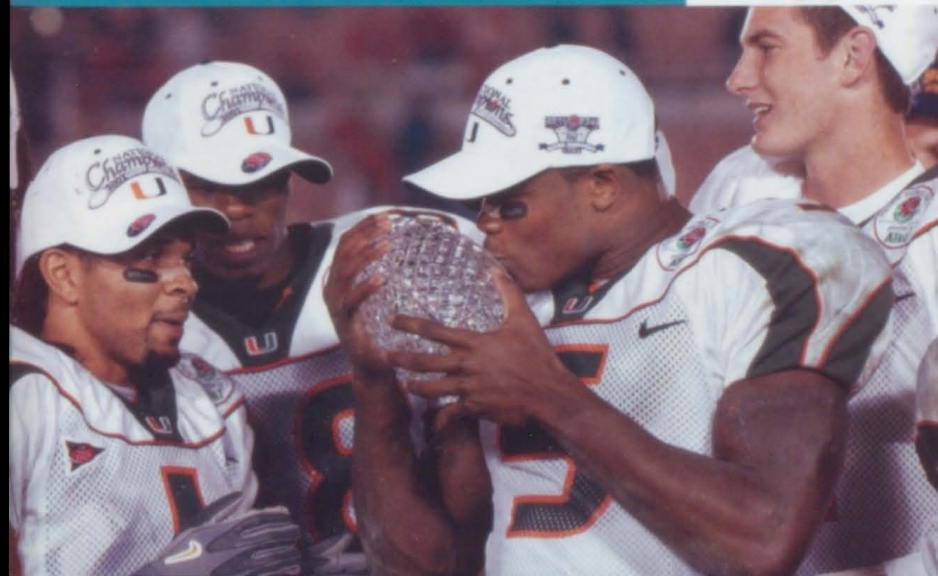
