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









Football team has memorable season

The Cowboy football team finished the 2002 season with a record of 6-3, with the final game being a loss to Viborg in the play-offs.

"Although the season ended in disappointment, I'm very proud of what we accomplished in my four years of football, such as beating Burke and Corsica and having winning seasons," said Tyler Croston, senior.

Defensively for the Cowboys, Reed Petersek was a leader with 79 tackles, followed closely by Tyler Croston with 78, and Justin Bicek with 77. Matt Karges led the team with four interceptions. Dustin Schrader and Bicek each had two, and Michael Bertram and Croston each had one interception. Brady Bertram and Michael Cahoy led the defense with 3.5 sacks each. Petersek also recovered two fumbles and caused one. Cahoy recovered two. Bicek caused one. Kyle Beck, M.

Bertram, Croston, and Schrader each recovered a fumble.

For the offensive side, Schrader led in total rushing yards with 768 yards. Schrader also led in touchdowns scored by rushing with 11, plus 10 extra points for a total of 76 points. Cahoy led in receiving yards with 287 yards. He scored 6 touchdowns and 2 extra points for a total of 38. Quarterback M. Bertram threw for 611 yards and 11 touchdowns.

"I have enjoyed playing football throughout my high school career," said Bicek. "I will never forget the excitement you have when you hit somebody, and I will never forget the memories."

"Overall, I think the season was a success, although there were disappointments, like the loss to Tripp and the loss to Viborg in the first round of playoffs," commented Coach Armstrong. "This is one of the better teams that Colome has had in the last decade."

Cowgirls gain skill

The 2002 Cowgirl volleyball team wrapped up a tough season with a record of 4-21. The four opponents that they defeated were Kadoka, Rock Co., Armour, and Winner.

"Throughout the season, we improved with every game we played. Our record didn't really show the true potential of our team. Most of the games were close, but we just fell short," commented Coach Billie Jo Indahl. "The most exciting part of the season was beating Winner. It's always fun to beat a rival school."

Only two seniors led the team this year: Desi Foster and Kristy Zink. "The best part of the season was beating Winner," said Foster. "That is what I want to remember about my senior volleyball season."

For the first time in five years, the Cowgirls had the same coaches for two consecutive years. Coach Billie Jo Indahl and Assistant Coach Korey Bertram once again led the Cowgirls this season.

In final season statistics, the Cowgirls were 81% serving with 216 aces. The Cowgirls spiked 73% with 294 kills. The team set 91% with 273 assists. The Cowgirls had 48% digging and 69% receptions.


To lead the Cowgirls in scoring this year was Allison Bertram with 86 points, followed closely by Foster with 81 points, including 42 aces. Stacy Ring was leading spiker with 76% and 73 kills. Michaela Bicek was 74% spiking and 76 kills. Leading setter for the Cowgirls was Bertram with 92% completing 834 of 906 with 261 assists. Leading in digs was Bicek with 55%, successfully digging 59 of 108 spikes, and Zink with 50% successfully digging 92 out of 185 spikes. Gabby Cox led the Cowgirls in receptions; successfully receiving 92 of 125 passes for 74%. Foster successfully received 120 of 168 passes for 71%.

"Our seniors will be greatly missed next year," said Coach Indahl.

Cowboys have winning seasor

The Cowboys had a change in routine this year. They had two new coaches: Head Coach Kevin Graesser and Assistant Coach Jeff Holzer.

The seniors leading the team this year were Michael Bertram, Justin Bicek, Tyler Croston, and Dustin Schrader.

Top scorers this season for the Cowboys were Michael Bertram with 298 points, Dustin Schrader with 217, and Justin Bicek with 165. As a team the Cowboys outscored their opponents 1,079 to 1,006, and the Cowboys averaged 59.9 points per game. Leading the Cowboys in 3 pointers this year were Bertram with 11-27 = 40.7%, Schrader with 10-34 = 29.4%, and Bicek with 11-39 = 28.2%. As a team the Cowboys made 33-111 3-point shots = 29.7%.

Leaders for field goals this season were Schrader with 81-163 = 49.7%, Bertram with 109-243 = 44.9%, and Bicek with 61-155 = 39.4%. As a team the Cowboys made 401-938 = 42.8%.

From the free throw line this season the Cowboys were led by Bicek with 76.2%, Bertram with 68.3%, and Schrader with 66.2%. As a team this season the Cowboys averaged 66.8% from the free throw line vs. their opponents with a 56.9% average.

Leading the Cowboys in rebounds this season were Schrader with 97, Bicek and A.J. Armstrong each with 78, and Bertram with 75. As a team the Cowboys averaged 28.5 rebounds per game, and as a team for the whole season the Cowboys had 513 rebounds. In blocked shots this year for the Cowboys, Bicek led with 9, Bertram and Croston each with 4, and Armstrong with 3. As a team total this season, the Cowboys had 23 blocked shots.


The top stealers this year for the Cowboys were Schrader with 41. Bertram with 34, and Bicek with 22. The Cowboys had 248 total steals for the season as a team. Leading the Cowboys in turnovers this year were Schrader with 47, Bicek with 42, and Bertram with 40.

For assists this season, the Cowboys were led by Schrader with 101, Bertram with 59, and Bicek with 21.

The Cowboys played ended with a successful record of 12-6.



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Injuries and illness make Cowgirl season difficult

The Cowgirls started the season with injuries, and conditions did not improve as the season progressed. First, they lost junior Michaela Bicek for the first three games of the season due to torn ligaments in her ankle. Sophomore Sami Beck was out for 10 games due to a broken elbow. Sophomore Jamie Richey was out for five games due to a sprained ankle. Junior Gabby Cox battled a hurt knee most of the season. Senior Lindsay Zeigler was out for two games with a stomach infection. Several of the other girls on the team battled weak ankles also.

Then on Jan. 17, the Cowgirls traveled to Bonesteel to play the Tigers, and everyone started to catch a nasty cold that just kept on mulitiplying until it came to the point where they could not even have practice because there were not enough girls. One day at practice, there were only three girls out of the original eleven Varsity players.

The Cowgirls' record this year was 5-14. The Cowgirls were led by three seniors this year: Sammy Steinke, Kristy Zink, and Zeigler. Returning letterwinners for the Cowgirls were seniors Steinke, Zink, and Zeigler, juniors Stacy Ring and Lacey Haukaas, and sophomore Beck.

Top scorers for the Cowgirls this year were Ring with 237 points, Steinke with 203, and Haukaas with 106. Haukaas tied the school record with Roxie Harter for the most three pointers made in a single game, which was six. The Cowgirls shot 35.7% from the field this season.

Top rebounders this season were Ring with 102, Zink with 75, and Steinke with 66. The Cowgirls averaged 26.5 rebounds per game.

Leading the Cowgirls from the free throw line this year were Steinke with 71.1%, Richey with 67.3%, and Ring with 56.0%. From the free throw line this year the Cowgirls shot 61.9% as a team.

Top leaders in blocking for the Cowgirls this year were Ring with 7, Beck with 4, and Zeigler with 3. The Cowgirls blocked the ball 18 times this season. Leaders in stealing the ball for the Cowgirls were Zeigler and Zink each with 33 and Ring with 32. The Cowgirls stole the ball 166 times this season. Leading the Cowgirls in turnovers this year were Steinke with 70, Zeigler with 67, and Ring with 66. As a team total this year the Cowgirls had 380 turnovers. 

Steinke travels to New Mexico for Nationals

Senior Sammy Steinke qualified for the National High School Rodeo during the summer of 2002. Steinke reviewed her summer in the following story that was published in the school newspaper.

High school rodeo season began the first weekend in May with practice rodeos. I attended a rodeo every weekend in May, excluding graduation weekend. The first weekend in June was the Regional High School Rodeo in Winner. There are two go-rounds at each regional rodeo, so participants have four chances to qualify for State. At Winner's rodeo I qualified in the breakaway roping, goat tying, and team roping. A participant has to be in the top ten of an event to qualify. If a cowgirl or cowboy places first, she/he receives 10 points. Second place earns nine points, and so on. After Winner's rodeo, I had 14 points in breakaway roping.

The next weekend was Watertown's Regional Rodeo. I won the roping there. Even though I picked up points at all

four rodeos, I could only take my best three. The most points a participant can have is 30, and I had 25 going into state. I was second in the state with one girl from the Northwest who had 26.

The third weekend in June brought the state finals. Each contestant has two go-rounds, and the top 15 come back for the short go. I had trouble the first two go-rounds and missed both calves. I was lucky to make it back to the short go. I had just enough points. I came in the 15th spot, so I really didn't think I had much of a chance at making nationals. I roped my first calf in 4.5 seconds to take fifith in the go. I ended up fourth going to nationals by beating two of my best friends by one point.

We left for Farmington, New Mexico, on July 19. It took 21 hours of driving straight through. I ended up earning 10th in my performance round, and overall South Dakota placed fifth in the team standings.

Petersek, a junior, participated in bronc riding as well as team roping with his partner, Kolt Shonebaum of Burke during the summer of 2002. In the spring of 2003, he participated in the Triple Crown Rodeo in Kadoka, White River, and Burke on May 2, 3, and 4. Petersek placed seventh in saddle bronc and third in steer wrestling at White River, fifth in steer wrestling in Burke, and ninth in the average in steer wrestling.


Bertram also participated in the high jump at the state meet and placed eighth with 5'11".

Head coach for the Demons was Andrew Overland from Winner, along with assistant coach Rusty Arthur, also from Winner.




The Demons ended their season with a successful 14-3 record.









The desktop publishing students took stories and combined them with pictures to create pages for both publications. This year's desktop publishing class with 11 students was larger than last year's class.





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







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

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

Steve Atteberry, vice president of the Colome School Board, awarded diplomas to the 17 seniors.


