



PIPPLES IN TIME.

Mr. Harry Everhart taught high school math for the first semester while Mrs. Lynn Thieman took a leave of absence. While he was here, he held chess games in the math room over noon for anyone who was interested.

Mrs. Loretha Webber's resignation as CHS music teacher became effective at the end of the first semester, and she was replaced by Ms. Chelsey Weigel.

Mr. Greg Sherman received the South Dakota American Legion Teacher of the Year award after being nominated by the Colome American Legion. He was nominated because of his involvement and success in the American Legion Oratory Contest.

Students participated in "Read for Katrina Victims Day" to raise money for the victims of Hurricane Katrina that struck the Gulf Coast. The students raised over \$3,000 which was later donated to the American Red Cross.

The school installed security cameras after receiving a South Dakota Homeland Security grant that provided the necessary money. A total of 15 cameras were installed throughout the three buildings.

Schools in the area enjoyed an extended Thanksgiving vacation after a blizzard struck that weekend. School was closed until Thursday. There was a late start on Friday morning, and school was again closed early. Spring break was also two days longer due to the winter weather. A total of eight school days were missed during the year. Maybe the yearbook theme should have been Drifts in Time...

The junior class decided to host their prom in the high school gym this year instead of having it at Skatetowne where it had been held in the past.

A bill was introduced into the state legislature that would close all schools with an enrollment under 100 students. This prompted school board member Pam Haukaas to sponsor an essay contest where students wrote letters in promotion of small schools.

Once a month students were dismissed early so teachers could attend in-services on curriculum mapping. Teachers created maps that related to the coursework that they teach during each month of the year.

These are just a few events that happened this year at CHS, and without a doubt there are many more. We have put them together throughout this book, and we hope you enjoy our recount of some of the Ripples in Time...













Seniors finish high school careers

On May 20, 2006, 11 seniors came to CHS for their last time as students. The graduating class contained only three girls and eight boys.




Juniors sell magazines, plan prom







Monday started off with Pajama Day. The students dressed up in their pajamas and wore them to school.







Several scholarships were presented during the ceremony. Chris Sherman and Courtney McCrellias were recognized as Regents Scholars and Honor Students.




to defeat the Cougars 25-23. South Central then defeated the Cowgirls in the next two games 25-21, 25-23.



Cowboys finish 2005 season 3-5







Young Cowgirl team puts together 6-16 record by Kristi Jo Miner

The 2005-2006 Cowgirl basketball team was the youngest that Coach Larry Koth has ever had in his 21 previous seasons as head coach at Colome. The team consisted of one junior, four sophomores, seven freshmen, two eighth graders, and six seventh graders.

"It was definitely a learning experience for all of us, and we are all looking forward to putting it to use next season," commented junior Rachele Schrader.

The Cowgirls also had to deal with their fair share of injuries this season. Four members of the team had to miss a few games after hurting their thumbs.

Ending up with a 6-16 record, the girls were outscored by their opponents 1082-943, which was about a seven-point deficit for each ball game. Colome managed to grab more rebounds each game than their opponents, pulling down 649 compared to 641. The Cowgirls had 271 assists to only 235 by their opponents.

As a team, the girls did not shoot very well. They shot only 31.7% from the field. The girls' free throw shooting was about 60.5%, and the Cowgirls

made ten more free throws than their opponents.

In the Southern Plains Conference tournament, the girls placed eighth with losses against Jones Co./Midland in the first round, Lyman Co. the next night, and Stanley Co. in the eighth place game.

During South Central Conference games, Colome posted a record of 2-3. It was good enough for the third best in the conference. The Cowgirls led in rebounding, grabbing an average of 35 in each conference game. Emily London and Kristi Miner were named to the South Central all-conference team, and Rachele Schrader and Claire Beck received honorable mentions.

London was also named to the Southern Plains Conference Team. Miner and Alisyn Graesser received honorable mentions.

The junior varsity team was coached by Mende Supik and finished the season with a record of 6-9. Their leading scorer was Collene Cahoy with 64 points, and Hailey Hughes followed with 42. Heather O'Bryan led in rebounds with 61, and Sami Luse pulled down 49 rebounds.



The meet took place at the O'Harra Stadium on the campus of the South Dakota School of Mines in Rapid City.






This year cheerleaders for football and boys basketball were both coached by Mrs. Amy Littau.



For the Easter holiday, NHS sponsored an Easter egg hunt for the little kids. It was held at the baseball and football fields.


On May 3, the NHS sponsored a town-wide clean up. The students and the faculty split into groups to clean different parts of the town.


